Course Description

As public problems become “wicked,” scholars of public management are asked to actively resolve such problems through various management strategies. In order for doctoral students to tackle wicked public problems, this course is designed with emphasis on two objectives: understanding of key concepts in public management theories and empirical applications of theories to real world data. The instructor will provide relevant data, and with the given data, students will be required to apply theories to their empirical studies.

Learning Objectives

As a professional, students will be expected to learn theories of public management and to improve abilities to apply theories to the practices. Moreover, students will be asked to critically think, professionally speak, and logically write what they learn from theories of public management.
