Japanese for Pure Biginners

(January - March, 2014)

Japanese for pure beginners is a course that aims at helping students with no prior knowledge of Japanese to acquire some basic working skills of the language, so that they can greet, introduce themselves, do shopping at a store, place an order in a restaurant and talk about some of the things they daily do. To achieve this goal each student is required to spend some time to memorize vocabularies, dialogs and set expressions. Although the development of speaking and listening skills will be more emphasized in the class, reading and writing *hiragana* and some *katakana* will be introduced as well. In this respect this course is also for providing students with enough knowledge to pass a qualifying test for Elementary Japanese 1 and Basic Japanese 1. **Active participation in class work is mandatory.**

[This course is mainly for those who missed the intensive Japanese program offered last summer. Therefore, those who have completed Basic/ Elementary Japanese 1 or a higher course are too overqualified to take this course.]

- A By the end of the course students will be able to:
- introduce themselves and ask about the listener's name, occupation, telephone number, etc.
- tell the time.
- do some shopping and order food at a restaurant.
- invite someone to do something with them, and also accept or decline such invitation.
- know how to write and recognize all the hiragana and a limitted number of katakana.
